Council Requests Study of Thorndale/Cobble Hills Intersection



Council passed a new motion put forward by Councillor Crockett and Councillor Heeman which called for improved road safety measures at the intersection of Thorndale Road and Cobble Hills Road.

The motion requested that the Counties of Oxford and Middlesex consider conducting a comprehensive traffic and roadway study of the intersection, following the conclusion of the ongoing OPP investigation.

The Mayor expressed condolences to the families and friends of the victims of last Friday's tragic car crash.

Mayor McMillan also informed Council that she has ordered the flags to fly at half-mast at municipal buildings for the rest of this week, in honour of the victims.

At the request of the OPP, Public Works has moved a radar speed reader, which displays to drivers how fast their vehicle is travelling, to Thorndale Road.
